CITY COUNCIL UPSET-FIREHOUSE LAWSUITS DRAGS ON

During the January city meeting, the city lawyer, via the city manager Michael Gortman notified the council that the meeting for all the parties involved in the lawsuits was delayed again.

The mayor complained that the lawyers involved seem to be the only ones making money on this mess by delaying the various court cases, yet no one is paying up to have the poorly built structure removed or repaired. The clock ticks for the FEMA new deadline come October of 2023. Presently there are now four lawsuits that the city of Wewa is involved with, concerning the matter.

CORN GRIFFIN STREET WOES CONTINUE

Several of the residents of the dirt road community on Corn Griffin Road continue to ask Gulf County and the city to fix their road and its various issues, due to flooding and poor maintenance by the Gulf County Road Department(which I believe to be contractors). The city council is in much agreement with the citizens on their complaints. The city manager has been in contact with the county on the issues at hand. Gulf County Commissioner Mr. David Rich will be asked to come to the next city meeting to discuss what the county can do to help in the meantime. A resident who lives on Corn Griffin Road, Mr. James Royce Watkins, as well as a few others discussed the latest issues with the dirt road not being properly kept by the county. They continue to have flooding after a rain because the road has not been, "Crowned" by the county as of this issue. Some folks are not able to drive to their homes or leave their homes, especially if they have thin tires or are on motorcycles. The city contacted the county over the issue via the city manager Michael Gortman last month on the matter, and the month before. They agreed to fix the crowning of the road but have not done so.

The city agreed to contact the county again, but this time, request Mr. Rich come to the February meeting. Mayor Gaskin and others in the meeting agreed that it would cost in today's dollars \$438,000 for one mile of preparation and paving. Corn Griffin Road is approximately ½ mile long, thus about \$220,000 to get the job done, the longer they wait the more it will cost. The city agreed to continue to look for funds via grants and other ways or avenues for the funds, including a bond fund that the city and the county agreed to many years ago. The bond money would be about half a

million dollars for Wewa to pave roads whenever we ever see the money. The city fathers continue to support the efforts of the Corn Giffin Road community to get something done. **TW**

Florida Homestead Protection Hmmm... Let's talk about it, shall we? by Tom Wynn

Whether the family residence is protected from creditors will largely depend upon the state's laws and the amount of protection that is allowed. The amount of protection by the State of Florida depends on the level of protection offered for the family home via homestead in Florida, which is the best in the Unites States in my personal opinion, along with the Long Horn State of Texas, our kissing cousins when it comes to protections of the people, "We The People".

Florida is in fact one of best states for benefits in this regard. Just one major reason why I love Florida so much. Think about it, more Sun, more Fun, more freedoms and a lot less TAXES, meaning more money for you to spend in all those shops that create jobs. Not filling up the banks with Taxes, that just never make it back to the people who made the sweat labor. Florida

loves its people and their visitors too. Just keep the peace and behave yourself, and you too can enjoy the Fun in the Sun, the Sundown moments with your Sweetie. We have thousands of places to see, and things to do. It would take a lifetime to do it all.

Florida treats U.S. Veterans with a high level of respect and gives them great tax breaks. They, that is "WE" Floridians make a point for you to come join us in the baking bright sunlight by buying a home here. We still have room for you and would leave the light on for you if it were not for the bugs that like to hang around the front door, just use a yellow light and that will help.

We, the People of Florida love our Vets, retirees and our elderly. One of the best places to put roots down and warm your bones at the same time.

Alabama, our near family, we laugh sometimes because "we in the Panhandle" say we are from "LA", Lower Alabama, LOL! Alabama is among the best in the country, possibly second only to Texas in Homestead protections.

In Florida, it is important not to confuse the homestead tax exemption from the exemption that is applicable for asset protection purposes both under the state laws as well as the federal bankruptcy laws in our state. The state of Florida offers 100% protection against the forced sale of a home. Homestead protection is guaranteed under Article X, Section IV of the Florida Constitution and it covers 100% of the real property value of up to 160 contiguous acres in any county in Florida or up to ½ acre in a municipality. Comparing Florida to the state of Texas, it offers even greater protection of 10 urban acres and 200 rural acres, and this protection is strictly enforced by the state courts (contact our local property Appraiser, Mr. Mitch Burch office personnel for more information on this subject matter).

Many states offering an "in between level" of protection allow approximately \$70 – \$170,000 of homestead real property value to be claimed as exempt from creditors in a state action or bankruptcy proceeding.

So, the effectiveness of this strategy will be largely based upon your local state's laws, or you might consider moving your residence to good ole' Florida (or to our cousins the great States of Texas, or Alabama). Another important point is that there are

exceptions to Florida homestead protection that generally include the default of your home mortgage because the mortgage is secured by a security interest (basically a written contract, which the government cannot interfere with according to the U.S. Constitution) in the home.

Homeowners' association actions for the community in which the homestead is found are also often secured by the home. Other exceptions may include IRS tax liens and, of course, divorce actions by a spouse (our supercreditors), both of which may be imposed on a Florida homestead.

The IRS and a Spouse have a lot of pull when it comes to getting your homestead home. So, make peace with each one. I hope this helps you get an understanding of how important it is for you to see Ms. Karen down in the Gulf County Court House (come to the front door, and make a left turn pass the Deputy Sheriffs, straight ahead you will see the Property Appraiser's Office). Go ask about Homestead Exemptions and IF you are a Veteran, the State of Florida has Exemptions for you too. So go save some money by filing Homestead Exemption starting January the Second. Peace to you and yours! Ms. Karen will sit you straight on your bennies. TW

>>>FLORIDA CONSTITUTION ARTICLE X, SECTION 4. Homestead; exemptions.--<

- (a) There shall be exempt from forced sale under process of any court, and no judgment, decree or execution shall be a lien thereon, except for the payment of taxes and assessments thereon, obligations contracted for the purchase, improvement or repair thereof, or obligations contracted for house, field or other labor performed on the realty, the following property owned by a natural person:
- (1) a homestead, if located outside a municipality, to the extent of one hundred sixty acres of contiguous land and improvements thereon, which shall not be reduced without the owner's consent by reason of subsequent inclusion in a municipality; or if located within a municipality, to the extent of one-half acre of contiguous land, upon which the exemption shall be limited to the residence of the owner or his family;

- (2) personal property to the value of one thousand dollars.
- (b) These exemptions shall inure to the surviving spouse or heirs of the owner.
- (c) The homestead shall not be subject to devise if the owner is survived by spouse or minor child, except the homestead may be devised to the owner's spouse if there be no minor child. The owner of homestead real estate, joined by the spouse if married, may alienate the homestead by mortgage, sale or gift and, if married, may by deed transfer the title to an estate by the entirety with the spouse. If the owner or spouse is incompetent, the method of alienation or encumbrance shall be as provided by law.





HOW TO ADDRESS MILITARY SERVICE MEMBERS WHEN THEY ARE RETIRED

The branch of service designation – USA, USMC, USN, USAF or USCG – and "Retired" or "Ret." are used on official correspondence and in official situations when it is important to specify the person is retired and is not on active duty. The service designation and retired are not used on social correspondence or in social situations.

Fully retired personnel are orally addressed by rank at their preference in (1) social situations and (2) official situations when their participation is related to their service in the military, or follow their lead, if they refer themselves as to their rank or military title, out of respect honor them by using what they told you at their introduction. (i.e. City meetings and County meetings, are two good examples).

In every case the service-specific abbreviation for the (full rank) can be used. These <u>service-specific abbreviations</u> are standard usage within the armed services of The United States. For official correspondence DOD guides use the comma ... and either *Ret*. or *Retired* is acceptable. I will show two formulas:

- —(Rank) (Full Name), (Branch of Service), (Retired)
- —(Rank) (Full Name), (Branch of Service), (Ret.)
- —Brigadier General Frank Sliverhair, USA, Retired —Brigadier General Frank Sliverhair, USA, Ret. You may want to consider for your computer databases using the service-specific abbreviations for the ranks: -BG Frank Sliverhair, USA, Retired--BG Frank Sliverhair, USA, Ret.

I was told that the airline pilots refuse to fly that far without the U.S. Coast Guard in the middle in case one of them went down.

So, after a few days out to sea, I saw the cooks throwing over the fantail plastic bags of garbage, several bags a day went overboard. I at once ran over and asked why they were doing that? They quickly responded, "The sharks would eat it very soon, they are following us, looking for a free meal." I could not believe my ears. But it was true. It was completely legal and was normal operation for ships to do this. I have never gotten over it, as you can tell as I write this story. Back then we humans did all kinds of things to the ocean that we would cry about today.

So, think about our own lakes and rivers, everything we put in the water, something is going to try to eat it, or die trying.

Please be wise and just keep "people stuff" in your boat and take it home, to get rid of it properly. Save our water resources and keep our fishery healthy. Are we in fact, what we eat? Are fish not the same too? Well then, you can see where I am going here. If it is not biodegradable, take it home with you. Birds are known to eat strange things that float in the water as well.
