Landmark gets new steeple

After 60 odd years
the Congregation of
First Presbyterian and
St. John the Baptist
Episcopal Churches of
Wewahitchka are
praising God and
giving thanks to Him
for the new steeple

recently erected on their small historic church.

The Church was built and consecrated in 1903 due to the efforts of **Dr. John W. Keyes** who arrived in Wewahitchka in 1875 and became a promoter of the little town. Lake Alice and Julia, the "eyes" lakes are named for his daughters. He imported a carpenter from Georgia to build him a home and the Episcopal Church.

It was during the 1930's that lighting struck the steeple, throwing the cross and upper part into the street.

In 1940 the North Florida Diocese of the Episcopal Church sold St. Johns to the Presbyterians and in 1950 an agreement was made by the two denominations to share the church. On Sundays at 8:00 the devoted Episcopalians gather to worship, later at 11:00 the Presbyterians have their service.

The two congregations this past year decided it was time to replace the steeple making it as near to the original as possible. A Committee from each church, David Bidwell and John W (Bo) Jones from Presbyterians, Sidney Cudebec and Max Kilbourn from Episcopal began work on the building and financing of the project with Sid Cudebec as general Chairman.

The dedication of this steeple with it's cross soaring above it will be a joyous one.

During the erection of the steeple Junior Strange donated the use of his cherry picker crane and his time for the entire installation of the project. (Photo above taken in 1903)



River, Carmen's bass boat sank after the fiberglass hull delaminated. He realized that his only recourse was to head to the hill. Unfortunately, he did not make it. His boat and newly-won 150 horsepower Mariner sank beneath the water. This untimely mishap certainly cost him the first place finish and, more importantly, a final step to fishing the BASS Masters Classic in 1997.

Carmen fought toe-to-toe with Steve Creel of Panama City throughout the entire tournament, going into the last day, Carmen led Steve by ounces. The turbulent weather and heavy rains caused the river to rise over a foot for the final day of competition. Since Carmen was without his boat he had to continue the tournament as a non-

boater, often fishing out of the back of other anglers' boats. The personal loss at home was always nearby. Carmen could have easily quit. but decided to continue the challenge.

On the last morning, both Carmen and Steve headed for the same area about 40 miles up river. Both fished the same pattern they had discovered together during practice. At the final weigh in, Steve had one more fish than Carmen. He took first place and won the tournament.

There were 96 anglers who qualified for this event. Carmen is a true professional, he finished fourth against all odds. He has proven that he is a major contender. We remember him saying that "I am not mad, but I will be back!" We know you will. We are all very proud of you, Carmen.

Honey Nut Brownies

- •1/2 cup butter•1/2 cup honey•1/2 cup sugar
- · 2 ounces chocolate · 2 eggs
- •1/2 cup flour, sifted with 1/4 tsp. baking powder
- •1 cup chopped nut meats

Butter and chocolate should be melted together, then honey, flour and baking powder, nuts. Bake 45 minutes. For immediate use it is better to use 1/2 sugar and 1/2 honey. Cut in strips 1/2 inch wide and 2 inches long. To pack away in a jar, use all honey instead of part sugar and do not use until after two weeks. Roll strips in powdered sugar before packing.

BUILDING A CHILD'S SELF-ESTEEM TIPS FOR PARENTS

Reinforce your love for your children often. Tell hem you love them and give plenty of hugs and isses.

Don't equate what your children do with who hey are. For example, tell your son he did a bad hing, not, "You're a bad boy."

Let your children know their thoughts and eclings are important to you.

Give children choices, not threats. Instead of aying, "If you don't stop playing ball in the rouse, you're going to get it!" try, "It's up to you, ou can either stop playing in the house, or you an go outside to play ball," Give your child a hoice only when you really want the child to lecide and then accept the child's decision.

Help your children set realistic goals and don't old them to unreasonably high standards.

Comments like. "you're wonderful." or "I'm groud of you." are good self-esteem builders, but earn to be specific, too. Identify your child's trong personality traits, such as thoughtfulness, ecatness, or sense of humor, and take time to comment on them.

Be polite to you children, by saying "please." nd "thank you."

Tell your children that you appreciate their help nd compliment them even on small tasks done well.


When asking something of a child, make sure to or she fully understands the rules and expectations. He or she will feel more confident with the responsibility.

Teach your children to solve their own problems. If they ask how to do something, don't to it for them. Explain or demonstrate how and et them try.

Always give your children a reason, particularly f they ask. Never say, "because I said so." This ignals that children are not worthy of an explanation.

Don't set limits on your children's abilities nake them feel they can do anything, and then traise their success!



Do you or someone you know need transportation to the doctor's office or clinic, or perhaps to Vital life-sustaining activities (i.e., grocery shopping, H.R. S., pharmacy, etc)? If so, there is a way to help. Gulf County Transportation services are provided to qualified individuals on a first-call, first-come basis contingent upon available dollars. The fleet of eight vehicles provide both ambulatory and non-ambulatory (i.e., wheelchair and stretcher) service to qualified citizens of Gulf County.

To determine if you qualify for transportation disadvantaged service, please call the Gulf County Transportation office at 229-6550 between the hours of 7:30 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. E.S.T. Monday through Friday. Medicaid recipients almost always qualify, but your Medicaid number must be submitted to Tallahassee for verification. Other citizens will be asked a few questions to determine if non-sponsored funding will be available. It only takes a few minutes of your time to call and find out. So. please call.

Another service was implemented June 1st. The Gulf County Transportation and the Gulf County Senior Citizens Association have teamed up to provide the senior citizens of Wewa with a Wednesday trip for nutritional and non-medical purposes. The Wewa Senior Citizens facility is open from 9:00 A.M. until 1:00 P.M. C.S.T. Meals are served around 11:00. Shopping and other life-sustaining activities may also be arranged during these hours. Meals should be coordinated through Ms. Fav Daniels at 639-9910. Transportation for the Wewa senior citizens should be coordinated through Glenda or Peggy at 229-6550. On behalf of Mr. Jerry Stokoe, Executive Director of the Gulf County Senior Citizens Association, we believe this arrangement will better accommodate our Wewa seniors.

SEAT BELTS AND CHILD SEATS

Do you buckle your children into a car seat or child carriers whenever you drive anywhere? Good for you. You're making an effort to ensure their safety and to ensure that they'll live to go to school, join the cub scouts, take up ballet, play little league, or whatever you have in mind for them.

You probably realize the danger of trying to hold a child in your lap. In an auto crash you wouldn't be able to hold onto a child at anything but the slowest of speeds. An auto collision at only 30 mph will throw a body around with a force equal to three times it's weight. So in a crash at the moderate speed, holding onto a 20 pound child would be the same as trying to hold on to 600 pounds. We're willing to bet you can't do that.

So you buckle the child into a safety seat. But what about yourself? When you get in the car with them, do you buckle yourself in before you go? By the same figures, you can't hold yourself in place. If you weigh 150 pounds, that same moderate speed crash will throw you around with a force equal to 4500 pounds. And we are almost sure that you can't hold onto 4500 pounds.

Consider this if you are still not convinced: If you don't buckle yourself in, your effort to maintain your children's safety may be futile in the end. The reason is that children learn, first of all, by observation. Children are very bright. They pick up amazing amounts of information just by watching you. They see you put them in a safe harness-like device and then they see you don't

put a similar device around yourself Your actions speak very loudly. If they reasoned it out they might say, "This belt thing is just for little people like me. It isn't for big people." They're bright, but they can be misled. They know that one day they'll be "big people" like you. They want to be like you; they want to do things you do. And they will. When they get to be "big people" they won't wear their seat belts either.

Assuming you have never had a car accident while they're in the car they won't see the necessity of a belt. Again they might reason. "Daddy tells me I need one to be safe in the car. But I am safe. Nothing happens when I'm in a car. Besides, Daddy never wears it."

As I clutched our frantic panting pet, his heart pulsating in his small chest, I expected he would positively die. I'm not certain who's heart beat faster, the dogs, mine, my still sobbing son's, or the old man bringing up the rear.

Relieved, we all inconspicuously ambled back down the street toward our RV expressing our deepest gratitude to our hero. Had it not been for him, our beloved family pet would still be running today.

An Interview With David Taunton

Wewa News: Judge Taunton, since 1979 you have been a father to the children who have lived in your home and with God's grace worked within 20 miles all these years. How will you be able to continue to be a good father and work in Washington D.C. with a busy schedule?


