Commission Reduces Budget & Saves money for Taxpayers!

With the City of Wewahitchka in good financial condition overall, now we know why. The City Commission worked hard last week during a workshop to reduce line items to save tax dollars and pay for repairs to the water system and other issues that were brought up by a few of the Commissioners as well as Chipper Wade and Michael Gortman (the city's leadership). Following Mayor Phillip Gaskin's lead, the City Commission lowered expenses and moved money around to cover much needed repairs around the city, which included sewage and water systems breakdowns, and rainwater drainage issues.

The Mayor and the Commissioners worked their way down each line item in the upcoming budget. I was amazed how they all worried over every dollar making sure that all expenditures were justified. They questioned everything that looked to be over budget or too expensive. They ordered two items to be bid on to reduce costs.

The line items that needed repair were given more funds with orders to get them repaired as soon as possible. While others were reduced because new technology was cheaper and easier to obtain. The City Clerks and City Manager need new laptops. This subject matter will be investigated more before the Commission approves any purchases.

THE CITY COMMISSION SET ASIDE THE NEW RV ORDINANCE FIRST READING

The City Commission voted to not do the first read of the new City RV Ordinance no. 2021-1213L on Thursday evening during the August City Council Meeting. Since several changes were made during a workshop by the Commission, none had a chance to read the changes since the workshop. The city lawyer made the changes and submitted the new document to the City Commission, but none had read the agreed changes as of yet. Even though

they took a few minutes to read the document, none of the public had a chance to read the ordinance either. So, the Mayor made a motion to hold off with the first read until the September meeting. The public can see the ordinance on the City of Wewa website or ask for a copy at the temporary City Hall next to Lake Alice Park. Other City business included poor water pressure at the end of Jehu Cemetery Road (Chipper Wade and crew will install a brand new 2-inch water pipe, authorized by Mayor Gaskin immediately).

Gulf County Sheriff Mike Harrison asked for a budget increase and was granted the new budget contract with the City to do additional policing in our fair city 24/7/365. The City has a good relationship with Sheriff Harrison, so they were glad to give his department an increase this year.

WEWA HISTORICAL GROUP NEWS

The group met for their third time on the 19th of August. They will start the process of voting in officers during the September meeting. The September meeting will be an important one as the Old Court House will be a major topic once again. The Mayor of Wewa, Phillip Gaskin, has requested that the Historical Group get with the city to do a workshop on Jehu Cemetery. It needs repair and cleaning. He stated in a city workshop that he desired to clean, repair, and add dirt to the cemetery. Tom Wynn suggested that the city crew and the Wewahitchka History Group work with the city as a project during a cooler month, such as November. The Cemetery needs love and the human touch. It holds some of our dearest relatives and friends remains in its soil. The Group has had this very topic in mind for the past several months now. They discussed going to the Iola grave sites to investigate their condition as well, finding their locations to restore what is there for future generations, and to protect them using state laws. James Rish gave his expert knowledge as to the condition and location of at least two to three cemeteries in the Iola area. Discussion was made about the old Iola Post Office location as well. Rish knows exactly where it was, as he placed bee boxes there as a boy and as a man often. Tom Wynn mentioned the old court house will be 100 years old in 2025 and strongly suggested that the City and the Wewahitchka Historical Group think about a festival that would last two days as an event. Mr. Wynn also discussed this idea with the Chamber of Commerce President Joe Whitmer - director@gulfchamber.org. Come join us!

OPEN LETTER TO CITY OF WEWA COMMISSION:

July 29, 2021

Subject: New City Hall, Wewahitchka Historical Museum, Rental Office Spaces Proposal

Dear Mayor Phillip Gaskin and City Commissioners,

Greetings! I introduced a new idea for the City of Wewahitchka to purchase the old Gulf County Courthouse (which is in disrepair and was damaged by Hurricane Michael) from Gulf County for \$1.00, to restore it completely with Federal and State Grants to its former glory, as well as modernize it as needed.

Windows were left open, causing further damage to the inside of the buildings with mold and water damage. After Hurricane Michael caused water damage to my home, mold remediation experts advised me not to open windows or doors as it helps the mold to grow faster. The old Courthouse needs to be restored to its former glory and upgraded to modern building codes. It would be wasteful to not repair and use it again.

I presented this idea during our last City workshop concerning grants and RVs. I offered to research the federal laws which state there is grant money for historical buildings and items of historical value to states, counties, cities, groups, and individuals.

The building is presently on the National and State of Florida historical lists and it would be a crying shame to even think of tearing it down at this point in our history. I know "We the People" would not stand for it, for sure. If the county has no use for the structure, we, the City of Wewahitchka, could purchase it from them for a small dollar amount and create our much-needed new City Hall, as well as a Wewahitchka City Historical Museum on the second floor. The building is one of only three in the State of Florida that has a floor like our courthouse does. It is a very rare building according to the information I obtained from our former county commissioner, Billy Traylor, during my research on this matter.

Any rooms not used for the city hall or for the museum could be rented out to local businesses, Gulf County Chamber of Commerce, lawyers, and accountants, for additional revenue to help with maintenance and repairs in the future. This all would

take place after the complete restoration of the building and its grounds (approximately 2 years or less in construction, I estimate as well as others).

Our **100th year celebration** of the forming of Gulf County is coming up in 2025. The Old Court house began its construction in the year 1925 and was completed in 1927. It would do the city good to have a great celebration on the Court house grounds and at Lake Alice for several days in 2025, restoration of the courthouse buildings, finished or not!

The newly formed **Wewahitchka Historical Group** is presently researching our local history, as well as the two ghost towns of Iola, Florida. Many folks in the Wewa and surrounding area desire to have a local historical museum to house their personal historical objects. These objects that can tell the story of the roots of Florida and their ancestors' lifestyles; working machines and devises, as well as daily tools and cooking utensils that their ancestors left behind. This includes local Indian, trappers, fishermen and paddle boat artifacts, which could be displayed in the museum. These things that recorded our history and their struggles to create such a paradise for their future generations. We need a place to display and admire our history before it is lost in time and dust. We the people, the public at large, is asking you to do what is best for Wewahitchka and for the north end of Gulf County, Florida.

We need to teach and tell stories of our ancestors, so they can never be forgotten. They worked hard to create our paradise and in God they trusted to make it a place of peace, love, and joy. We truly love one another and this ground in which we live upon.

We are the guardians of what they built and left behind for us to enjoy and ponder. It is our duty to protect and preserve their symbol of strength and power to live in peace with one another, in law, and mutual respect. The old Gulf County Court house is our symbol of that love and respect for our history and for our future generations "Lift Up Wewa!"



 Destiny: *Usually paint isn’t my chosen art medium. I prefer doing small, detailed pencil sketches. Whenever I have painted, it’s always been on an 11”x14” canvas. The murals were huge in comparison.*

Library: Of all your works of art, what are you most proud of?
 Destiny: *This is a hard question; I don’t really know if I can pick just one. I love the lama painting that I did in the library. The colors are vibrant and it’s more my painting style than the others were. But as far as past works, I think I would have to say the Plain Air painting that I did last spring. A few of us got selected by Coach Vines to go to an art festival in Apalachicola, and I got paired with Tara Wills to do an oil painting. I had to work in real time and paint what I saw in front of me. The experience was completely new, and the painting turned out pretty amazing!*
