WEWAHITCHKA WOMEN'S CLUB SPONSORED A PUBLIC FORUM ON HUMAN TRAFFICING

In the evening hours of February, the 22nd, Panama City Police Chief Talamantez (also a Marine Vet.) and Ms. Sula Skiles came to Wewa Elementary school to teach those that attended how to spot human trafficking in our own community. Also in attendance was the retired director of the Gulf County Domestic Violence Task Force, Pam Martin, who spoke on Teen Dating Violence and Family Violence.

City Commissioner Ralph Fisher, his wife Patty Fisher and I were in attendance. Members of the GFWC and the public asked questions and offered their own stories of "Stranger Danger" events in their lives.

Ms. Skiles shared her firsthand experiences as a victim of human sex trafficking and slavery, having been a sex slave for a Billionaire's girlfriend. After years of slavery, she managed to escape and went to the authorities.

Police Chief Talamantez and Ms. Skiles hopes are that we who live in the Panhandle be more watchful for human traffickers as they come into our area. Learn more about their operations, ways of tricking people into their system of slavery, so we can better protect ourselves and our loved ones.

TALKS ARE IN THE WORKS-THE DEVIL IS IN THE DETAILS

Mr. Tommy Hamm's company (Winterfell Construction) did not complete the structure nor hand over the keys to the new fire house on the 26th of December (after you figure

all the rain days the city agreed to for extra time due to heavy rain) as agreed. The Bonding company lawyers, and our city lawyer are in discussions currently. Mayor Phillip Gaskin was asked to enter the talks as requested by the lawyers involved, meeting the 9th of March. "Standby to standby" as we use to say in USCG Aviation when a big case was in the works.

In the January city meeting, the city commissioners authorized the city lawyer to contact the bonding company of the contractor after the vote tallied. Before the vote, Mr. Hamm, the owner of Winterfell Construction company was given time to explain his reasons for the various concerns and delays the commission had issues with to the city council and the public.

He gave reasons why there was cracks in the floor, brick issues and roofing issues that concerned the city council. He continued with placing the blame on the city of Wewahitchka and its council for his delays, materials not arriving on time, change orders not signed by the council during an earlier special meeting by the city as well as other issues, i.e., one of his contractors passed away. He complained that Wewa had more rain than any other place he claimed, which he added to his reasons for not completing his contractual obligations to the city of Wewahitchka.

During the meeting Mayor Gaskin asked him directly if he was blaming the City of Wewa for his woes in completing the building as agreed. (The city of Wewa has yet to place an 80,000-pound Fire truck on the concrete slab, yet it has a crack in it and a void under the concrete, as per Mr. Jack Husband, the Engineer in charge of the project for the city of Wewa). Jack Husband is the city’s representative on the project. The contract is clear-the City of Wewa is “The Owner” of the site, the land and the purse-strings for the Fire House. Mr. Tommy Hamm, during the meeting said he was “The Owner.” The public and the Council all heard him say this.

I saw the sadness in the face of the Mayor Phillip Gaskin, when he heard Mr. Tommy Hamm say these things. He had no choice but to fire Winterfell Construction at that point, he told the city lawyer to terminate Mr. Hamm’s company immediately.

The Contract clearly says that the City of Wewahitchka is “the Owner” several times in the contract and gives a deadline for the keys to be turned over to the City of a completed fire station as agreed by December 26, 2021(with the rain days considered in).

Due to the city complaints of noncompliance of the contract and other issues, and Mr. Hamm placing the blame squarely on the City Council (pointing a finger at Mr. Ralph Fisher personally, at the end of his presentation) as well as Mr. Jack Husband’s

Engineering crew, saying that poor design was the reason for the cracks in the slab. All this gave good reason for the mayor as well as the entire Wewahitchka city council to agree that the quality of the fire house construction is subpar by Winterfell Construction. Thus, they voted to shut the project down and barred Winterfell Construction from the site, unless a city employee was present to recover their tools etc.

The fire station is now months behind in its completion date, to the point that the city clerk, Ms. Rachel Jackson must contact FEMA asking for more time to get the building completed. Just more paperwork for the city workers and more worry for “We the People” not having our fire station with its new equipment up and running (since the start of the project Wewa has had four house fires, all the people made it out safe, one dog passed away in one of the fires).

The council voted 3 to 0 to allow the Lift Stations Contracts to go ahead. Lift Stations 5 and 11 then 3 and 4 later.

The city council was informed by Chipper Wade that we only have one water pump in operation at this time. The mayor told Wade to buy a new well pump asap because he believed only having one water pump in operation was a major emergency to the city. Wade agreed and will order one at once.

The County Sheriff, Mike Harrison was consulted by the Council on how the Robo Cop Speed sign was doing on 2nd street. Several folks that live on 2nd street complained to the city council on how dangerous the traffic had become last month. All agreed that it was helping and requested it stay in place for another month.

Mr. Justin Suber requested the city workers help keep the ball fields in better condition during the off season, to make it easier for everyone to prep for the next season when it is time. The city agreed to get the inmate cleanup crews to keep the fields up during the off season. TW

Not only that but they put in a lot of work on the computer researching and looking for information for the group dig.

We had quite a turn out, young and old, and I was so excited that Ms. Vera Rozier who had just turned 98 years old this month was able to come out and have some fun with us. She is remarkable and held up better than most of us!

We still have quite a bit left to do so we will schedule another day soon to return to the "dig site". I will keep you updated by email and when possible, in the Wewa News.

Also, we finished working the bricks for the Presbyterian Church, the foundation is finished, and the Church is in place. We cleaned over a thousand bricks making them useful again. Thanks to the local volunteers for their help.

We need some help with writing down any buildings, homes, structures or cemeteries older than 50 years old. There is a group, LG2, who will be coming in March for a week to document all the places for our town and in Gulf County proper. They will be pulling up the property appraisers records to get a lot of the info but as locals we know where there are a lot of things that may not be listed there.

I have listed some of the older homes I can think of and I put the bridge at the Dam and Dead Lakes, water tower and the boat landings that I can think of as structures. I know there are bound to be plenty of other things. He mentioned things like turpentine stills, old barn structures, moonshine stills (LOL), old bee aeries/houses, barns and other things that may not be on a property appraiser listing. Just jot down anything you have and give me the list at the meeting or email me what you have, please.

Also, the library is in need of 2 or 3 more of the little library boxes like the ones placed around town. They don't have to be exact but need to be weatherproof for the books. If you have any building skills and willing to donate building a box or two, I will check and see if

Fishers or Ace Hardware may have some scrap lumber, they will donate to the group. Hope to see everyone at the meeting!!


**WEWA CHURCHES UNDER CONSTRUCTION




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**THE MORGAN PADDLE BOAT

For nearly a hundred years, from the 1830’s to the 1920’s, steamboats traveled the Chattahoochee, Apalachicola and the Flint Rivers.

They were bringing cotton from 19 different counties in Georgia, Alabama and Florida along with travelers down south to Iola, Wewahitchka, St. Joesph and Apalachicola, carrying people, barrels of nails, slaves, freemen, lumber, peanuts, various trade goods-including luxury goods imported from China and European nations-to individuals, stores, farmers, businessmen, plantations down river as well as back up the river.

Both Iola’s (the old and new Iola’s are both ghost towns today) and Wewahitchka were important river boat landings during this period in our history.

We are in dire need of the entire Sewage system replacement (the BP Grant is supposed to pay for all of that, and it should take about 12 years to replace our entire system). When that will happen, its up to the BP Grant via the State of Florida, see last March and April Wewa News articles for information I researched last year).

We welcome newcomers and strangers showing them that we love more, give more and respect more. We are a foundational people, our roots are from the Pioneers that

first settled southern parts of Alabama, Georgia and North Florida, and those natives who taught our families how to live on the land and in the river areas. We are tough folks, yet we are very loving (just don't mess with our bees).

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

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BOLDLY COMPLETING THE FIVE-YEAR MISSION!

Aaron Wynn, my youngest son took me on an adventure to a place I never heard of, nor ever dream existed. Just 3 miles north of the Florida-Georgia line near Jacksonville, is a place most folks didn't know existed either. BUT! The diehard Star Trek fans know about it, and now The Wewa News Readership will too. A place where "**Beam me up Scotty!**" is quite commonly spoken there. Those famous words can be heard in the original series that every Star Trek fan knows well. It has become an Idiom for our baby boomer generation.

Captain James T. Kirk and his mighty crew travel the stars on a 5-year mission (which ended only after 3 seasons). No worry, the Big Screen soon took over and now you know the rest of the story...Nope! They never finished the 5-year mission they started, now did they?

There was a young boy that remembered that, and soon he was able as a screen and voice actor to make it

happen for all of us, who wished they had finished that mission. Years later with the nod from key players in the Star Trek world to finish the series, in living color, **Vic Mignogna**, a screen and voice actor was to finish the series. His childhood idea came true, with hundreds of Star Trek Fans, a lot of money, time, and energy and made it happen.

He used a lot of his own funds and then raised additional monies with the help of some of the original series actors, other Star Trek series actors and many loving fans. **STAR TREK CONTINUES** built a replica of the original sound stage within 1 inch of its original design. Vic has put much sweat and money into the project, and that effort worked. It looks just like the original, because he was given the blueprints and design information from the original crew with the okay from CBS, they went to work, it happened, it was done!

Today they have a 18,500 -square-foot studio which now houses the most complete, to the inch, TOS sets in the entire world. It includes the bridge, corridors, crew quarters, sickbay, including the fancy beds with gold flake orange bedspreads (customed made for Vic by a modern factory), turbo-lifts, a full-size engine room, Jeffery tube, aux control room and, yes, the Transport station. All the walls can come apart so the camera crew can be placed for the best shots, and then put back together again, for the next take.

I was able to go when Vic was giving free tours in February, so I was treated like a King by the staff (who are also actors), learning lots of good stuff about the show, the actors and how things happened back in the 1960's. So, take a trip and see for yourself this amazing replica of one of our favorite TV shows that changed the world.

Vic with his acting crews and stagehands made 11 fan-produced web series of the original adventure, finishing the series 5-year mission. I bought the Blue Ray version while I was there. I watched the first one, and it was well done folks, so I look forward to the rest. LYN! Where is the popcorn?
